#### **Purpose and Priorities**

• The primary goals of the BFRDP, under assistance listing number 10.311, is to help beginning farmers and ranchers in the United States and its territories:

Enter and/or improve BFR successes in farming, ranching and management of nonindustrial private forest lands

Support for projects that provide education, mentoring and technical assistance Give BFRs the knowledge, skills and tools needed to make informed decisions for their operations and enhance their sustainability



# Eligibility

- Applications may only be submitted by a collaborative state, tribal, local or regionally based network or partnership of qualified public and/or private entities, including:
  - State Cooperative Extension Services
  - Federal, State, municipal or tribal agencies
  - Community-based organizations (CBOs)
  - Non-governmental organizations (NGOs)
  - Junior and four-year colleges or universities or foundations maintained by a college or university
  - Private for-profit organizations



# Eligibility, Exclusions


- Application submission of a project effort that is a duplicate of a current BFR project will not be accepted for review.
- Applications submitted by individuals, or by organizations that do not involve other entities in a network or partnership are, will not be accepted for review.
- Please do not apply for another Simplified Standard grant if you were previously awarded one. Simplified Standard grants are designed for new applicants who have never received grants, nor gained more than three (3) years of experience in assisting BFRs.



### Application Submission & Award Limitations

- To meet geographical diversity, multiple awards will not be made to the same organization, institution, or Project Director in the same calendar year.
- Organizations and institutions that have received a Standard or Education team grant in the last two funding cycles (FY2022 or FY2023) are ineligible to apply.
  - Project Directors and Co-Project Directors on current BFRDP projects (FY2022 or FY2023) are ineligible to apply this funding cycle.

#### Match Requirement

- BFRDP awardees must provide 25% match from non-Federal sources in the form of cash or in-kind contributions
  - NIFA may waive the matching funds requirement for a grant if it is determined that a waiver or modification is necessary to effectively reach an underserved area or population
  - If you plan to serve an underserved area or population, please enter the statement at the top of your budget justification form: "This applicant plans to serve an underserved area or population and would like to request the 25% match waiver."

#### **Application Details (contd.)**

**RFA Page #18-23** 

- Project Narrative is **20 page limit, or 10 pages for Simplified Standard Grants** and will be strictly enforced.
  - 1.5 spacing
  - 12 point Times New Roman font
  - Includes text, figures and tables
    - Tables may be single spaced
- Within 20 pages, or 10 pages for Simplified Standard Grants describe:
  - List of headings of information required in narrative
  - If applicable, Response to Previous Review for Resubmissions (additional 1 page, does **not** count towards page limit for the PN)
  - If applicable, Prior BFRDP Accomplishments (additional 1 page, does not count towards page limit for the PN)
- Applications exceeding the page limitation will be returned without review.




### Data Management Plan

- Investigators must provide detailed (up to 2 pages) business and management plans including:
  - Expected data type
  - Data format
  - Data storage and preservation
  - Data sharing, protection and public access
  - Roles and responsibilities

# **Application Submission**

- NIFA only accepts electronic submission of applications.
- NIFA Grants Application Guide available: <u>nifa.usda.gov/resource/nifa-grantsgov-application-guide</u>
- Application documents must be in Portable Document Format (PDF) to be accepted by NIFA, including your narrative and budget justifications.
  - Grants.gov may allow other formats, but NIFA does *not*
  - Do not use third-party PDF builders

#### **Evaluation Process**

RFA Page #28

Proposals are assigned for review to at least 3 reviewers with expertise in the proposed topic.

**Reviewers will** produce individual reviews of each proposal, evaluating the strengths and weaknesses.

These written reviews are used to begin panel discussions with other reviewers serving on the peerreview panel.

Through these discussions, peerreview panelists come to consensus on the final rating and ranking of proposals.

### **BFRDP Evaluation Criteria**

- 1. Partnerships and Collaborations
  - □ To what extent does the proposal represent a substantial and effective collaborative network or partnership of public and/or private entities?
  - Does the proposal include the necessary partners to meet the needs of the audience?
  - Does the proposal make appropriate use of the expertise and strengths of each partner?
  - Does the application include Letters of Commitment signed by the AR of the partnering organization?



### **BFRDP Evaluation Criteria**

- 2. Consultation of Beginning Farmers and Ranchers
  - Does the proposal explain and document the role of beginning farmers and ranchers played in the design, implementation, and decision making related to the proposed initiative and project activities?
    - Does the proposal support new and established local and regional training, education, outreach, and technical assistance initiatives to increase opportunities for beginning farmers and ranchers?



### **BFRDP Evaluation Criteria**

- 3. Relevancy
  - Does the proposal identify and direct its work towards BFRDP priorities listed in the RFA?
  - Does the proposal describe the necessity of the project based on needs identified for the target audience?
  - Does the proposal describe the degree to which the project addresses audience needs and/or geographic area(s) not served by previous and alternative training, outreach, mentoring and education programs?



### **BFRDP Evaluation Criteria**

- 4. Technical Merit
  - Does the proposal clearly describe project objectives, activities, and outcomes?
  - Does the proposal describe the likelihood of success of the proposed activities and conceptual adequacy of the proposed activities to meet the needs of the targeted audience, including feasibility of the approach?
  - □ Are the objectives and activities innovative and original?
  - Are the expected performance targets, outcomes and incomes indicated in a plan for outcome-based reporting?
  - □ Are the project partnerships and collaborations sustainable?
  - □ Is the budget for planned activities reasonable within the scope of the project?



### **BFRDP Evaluation Criteria**

- 7. Achievability
  - □ Is the probability of success appropriate given the level of originality, target audience and budget for each activity?
  - Does the applicant identify pitfalls and how they will be addressed?
  - Is there sufficient time commitment of project directors (and co-directors) for project activities and management?
  - □ Is there sufficient time allocated for systematic attainment of objectives?
  - Are there clearly defined roles and relationships among key participants and collaborators?
  - □ Is there a plan for decision-making and collaborative effort administration?



### **BFRDP Evaluation Criteria**

- 8. Expertise and track record of the applicants
  - Does the proposal demonstrate expertise through successful multi-year experience in education outreach, mentoring and/or technical assistance of BFR?
  - Is the successful multi-year experience demonstrated by number of training, assistance, or educational activities previously carried out? And/or number of participants or graduates of the program, success rate and their current occupation?
  - Are there detailed qualifications of the applicant (individual or team) to conduct proposed activities and project outcomes in serving the needs of the target audience?



### **BFRDP Evaluation Criteria**

- 9. Adequacy of available or obtainable support personnel, facilities, and instrumentation
  - Does the proposal include expertise of collaborators and consultants?
  - Does the proposal have sufficient education facilities and equipment for the proposed education and outreach methods?



### **BFRDP Evaluation Criteria**

Demonstrate your project's fit in your application. Below are some questions to address when preparing your BFRDP funding application.

- 10. Adequacy of plans for participatory evaluation process, outcome-based reporting, and the communication of findings and results beyond the immediate target audience
  Does the proposal identify the evaluation team members and their expertise?
  - Are the expected performance targets, impacts and *outcomes* measurable, and achievable within the allotted time frame?
  - □ Is the **logic model** detailed in guiding program planning, implementation, and evaluation?
  - □ Is a **Data Management Plan** detailed?

Does the proposal articulate how the PD and co-PDs plan to manage and disseminate the data generated by the project?



### **BFRDP Outcomes Based Reporting**

- Inputs: resources used to implement the project (i.e., people, money, materials)
- Outputs: things produced as a results of the projects' activities (i.e., educational materials, publications, conferences)
- Outcomes: changes in knowledge, behavior, or condition
- Target audience: those who benefit directly or indirectly from the project

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


