Please describe the **importance and objectives** of a veterinarian filling this shortage situation as well as being located in the community, area, state/insular area, or position requested above (limit your response to 200 words or less).

1. Supplement an existing rural veterinary practice in Roosevelt, Utah to serve the private practice needs of Uinta and Duchesne Counties. The Veterinarian at this practice is in his early 60's and has developed some health problems related to the demands of Large Animal Practice which is primarily beef cattle (80,000 beef cows).
2. Accreditation for the practicing veterinarian in order to address program disease needs of federal and state governments. As an example, tuberculosis and brucellosis program monitoring and testing.
3. Be able to perform antemortem and postmortem inspection of animals intended for human consumption at the small, federal and state inspected facilities in this county.
4. Act as a professional resource to the community regarding zoonotic diseases especially endemic the Uinta Basin.. (e.g., plague, hanta virus, Arizona rabies, hydatid disease)
5. Address the companion animal needs of the ranching and farming communities, along with those needs of the small, rural municipalities in this county in reference to their public health, rabies and pet over population mandates.

Please describe the **activities** of a veterinarian meeting this shortage situation in the community, area, state/insular area, or position requested above (limit your response to 200 words or less).

We envision this veterinarian to come into practice with Dr. Nelson Duncan who currently is the owner of Uinta Veterinary Service. This veterinarian would base their practice from this clinic. Because of the remote nature of these counties, this practitioner would need to have a mobile clinic from which to practice from during farm and ranch calls. The fixed facility is capable of addressing emergency small and large animal needs.

Please describe any past efforts to recruit and retain a veterinarian in the shortage situation identified above (limit your response to 100 words or less).

Dr. Duncan has for many years tried to attract an associate into this practice. Because of the large number of beef cows in this area, the ranchers are under served and are frequently pursuing methods of skirting the practice act so that they can perform procedures that veterinarians should be doing. The economy of Uinta to a degree is still based on farming and ranching. Any efforts to attract an additional veterinarian to this area have been unsuccessful because of the income needed to meet current student loan obligations of new graduates.

Please describe the risk of this veterinarian position not being secured or retained. Include the risk(s) to the production of a safe and wholesome food supply and to animal, human, and environmental health not only in the community but in the region, state/insular area, nation, and/or international community (limit your response to 250 words or less).

Because of the veterinary shortage in this area, many food animal related issues have become problematic. As an example, in order for cattle to be shipped properly between states, certificates of veterinary inspection are needed to accompany the cattle. Due to the shortage of veterinarians, this is often overlooked and has become a problem in this region.
