EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: NIFA requests applications for the Special Research Grants Program, Potato Breeding Research (Potato Breeding Research) for fiscal year (FY) 2014 to facilitate or expand ongoing state-federal food and agricultural research programs.

Pursuant to H.R. 3547, the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2014, the amount available to support this program in FY 2014 is approximately \$1,238,000.

This notice identifies the objectives for Potato Breeding Research projects, the eligibility criteria for projects and applicants, and the application forms and associated instructions needed to apply for a Potato Breeding Research grant.

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PART I—FUNDING OPPORTUNITY DESCRIPTION

A. Legislative Authority and Background

The authority for this program is contained in subsection (c)(1)(B) of section 2 of the Competitive, Special, and Facilities Research Grant Act, Pub. L. No. 89-106, as amended (7 USC 450i(c)(1)(B)).

In accordance with the statutory authority, grants awarded under this program will be for the purpose of facilitating or expanding ongoing State-Federal food and agricultural research programs that: (i) Promote excellence in research on a regional and national level; (ii) promote the development of regional research centers; (iii) promote the research partnership between the Department of Agriculture, colleges and universities, research foundations, and State Agricultural Experiment Stations for regional research efforts; and (iv) facilitate coordination and cooperation of research among States through regional research grants.

The statutory time limitation for awards issued under this authority is three years. No award may exceed this statutory time limitation.

B. Purpose and Priorities

The purpose of this grant program is to support potato (*Solanum tuberosum* L.) research programs that focus on varietal development and testing of potato varieties for commercial production. As used herein, varietal development and testing is research using classical breeding and/or biotechnological approaches to develop improved potato varieties. Aspects of evaluation, screening and testing must support variety development.

C. Program Area Description

Program Name: Potato Breeding Research

Program Code: AN

The Potato Breeding Research program funds projects that have a high potential to develop potato varieties with a high value to the potato industry. Priority will be given to proposals demonstrating qualified staff, adequate facilities and equipment, a multi-institutional, multi-state approach, and evidence of stakeholder participation in developing project objectives and plans for implementation.

The Potato Breeding Research program directly aligns with the Research, Education, and Economics Action Plan (www.usda.gov/documents/usda-ree-science-action-plan.pdf) and specifically addresses the following goals:

Goal 1 – Local and Global Food Supply and Security, Subgoals 1A, 1B, and 1C (which focus on Crop Production, Health, Genetics, Genomics, Genetic Resources, and Biotechnology); and Goal 2, Sustainable Use of Natural Resources, Subgoal 2A. Responding to Climate Variability; and Goal 4. Nutrition and Childhood Obesity.

The Potato Breeding Research program encourages projects that develop content and programs suitable for delivery through the Cooperative Extension System's eXtension Initiative. Please note that this is not a requirement for Potato Breeding Research Projects. You may use funds to contribute to the existing Community of Practice (CoP) – Plant Breeding and Genomics. Projects must align with the eXtension vision, mission, and values. Projects that decide to propose eXtension content must have a letter of acknowledgement from eXtension; and you may also need a letter of support from the Community of Practice. PART II—AWARD INFORMATION

A. Available Funding

Pursuant to H.R. 3547, the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2014, the amount available to support the Potato Breeding Research Program in FY 2014 will be approximately \$1,238,000.

There is no commitment by USDA to fund any particular application or to make a specific number of awards.

Awards issued as a result of this RFA will have designated the Automated Standard Applications for Payment System (ASAP), operated by the Department of Treasury's Financial Management Service, as the payment system for funds. B. Types of Applications

In FY 2014, you may submit applications to the Potato Breeding Research Program as one of the following two types of requests:

(1) New application. This is a project application that has not been previously submitted to the Potato Breeding Research Program. We will review all new applications competitively using the selection process and evaluation criteria described in Part V—Application Review Requirements.

(2) Renewal application. This is a project application that requests additional funding for a project beyond the period that was approved in an original or amended award. Applications for renewed funding must contain the same information as required for new applications; they also must contain a Progress Report (see Project Narrative, Part IV). Renewal applications must be received by the relevant due dates, will be evaluated in competition with other pending applications in the area to which they are assigned, and will be reviewed according to the same evaluation criteria as new applications.

C. Project Types

Each special research grant proposal submitted in FY 2014 shall request funding for a period not to exceed one year. FY 2014 awardees will need to re-compete by submitting renewal applications for additional funding in the second and third years of the project. Renewals are subject to the availability of funding.

D. Scientific Peer Review

Subsection (c)(5) of the Competitive, Special, and Facilities Research Grant Act, as amended (7 U.S.C. 450i(c)(5)) requires applicants to conduct scientific peer review of their proposed research activities in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Secretary prior to the Secretary

making a grant award under this authority. Regulations implementing this requirement are set forth in 7 CFR Part 3400.20. The regulations impose the following requirements:

(1) Scientific peer review: Prior to the award of a standard or continuation grant, any proposed research project shall have undergone a review arranged by the grantee. Such review must be a scientific peer review conducted in accordance with 7 CFR 3400.21. Scientific peer review is an evaluation of a proposed project for technical quality and relevance to regional or national goals performed by experts with the scientific knowledge and technical skills to conduct the proposed research work. It must be credible, independent, and arranged by the grantee. Often this review is conducted by faculty peers. It may include USDA employees, but should not be conducted solely by USDA employees. Although evidence of a scientific peer review is not required until an award is ready to be finalized, peer reviews can improve the quality of a proposal. We thus encourage applicants to have proposals peer reviewed before submission.

(2) Notice of completion and retention of records: A notice of completion of the review shall be conveyed in writing to NIFA as part of the Other Attachments (Field 12. of the R&R Other Project Information Form). The written notice constitutes certification by the applicant that a review in compliance with these regulations has occurred. Applicants are not required to submit results of the review to NIFA; however, proper documentation of the review process and results should be retained by the applicant. The notice should state “In accordance with 7 CFR 3400.21 this memo is to certify that this project [title] has undergone a scientific peer review.” If this notification is included within the application, a signature is not necessary. If, however, it is submitted to NIFA after the application is submitted through Grants.gov, the memo must be on the institution’s letterhead and signed by the Authorized Representative.

E. Responsible and Ethical Conduct of Research

The responsible and ethical conduct of research (RCR) is critical for excellence, as well as public trust, in science and engineering. Consequently, we consider education in RCR essential to the preparation of future scientists. In accordance with sections 2, 3, and 8 of 7 CFR Part 3022, institutions that conduct USDA-funded extramural research must foster an atmosphere conducive to research integrity, bear primary responsibility for prevention and detection of research misconduct, and maintain and effectively communicate and train their staff regarding policies and procedures. In the event an application to NIFA results in an award, the Authorized Representative (AR) assures, through acceptance of the award that the institution will comply with the above requirements. Per award terms and conditions, grant recipients shall, upon request, make available to NIFA the policies, procedures, and to support the conduct of the training.

Note that the training referred to herein shall be either on-campus or off-campus training. The general content of the ethics training will, at a minimum, emphasize three key areas of research ethics: authorship and plagiarism, data and research integration, and reporting misconduct. Each institution will be responsible for developing its own training system, as schools will need flexibility to develop training tailored to their specific student needs. Grantees should consider the Collaborative Institutional Training Initiative (CITI) program for RCR

(www.citiprogram.org/rcrpage.asp). Typically this RCR education addresses the topics of: Data Acquisition and Management - collection, accuracy, security, access; Authorship and Publication; Peer Review; Mentor/Trainee Responsibilities; Collaboration; Conflict of Interest; Research Misconduct; Human Subject Research; and Use of Animals in Research.

PART III—ELIGIBILITY INFORMATION

A. Eligible Applicants

Applications may only be submitted by State agricultural experiment stations, land-grant colleges and universities, research foundations established by land-grant colleges and universities, colleges and universities receiving funds under the Act of October 10, 1962, as amended (16 USC 582a et seq.), and accredited schools or colleges of veterinary medicine. Award recipients may subcontract to organizations not eligible to apply provided such organizations are necessary for the conduct of the project. Failure to meet an eligibility criterion by the time of application deadline may result in the application being excluded from consideration or, even though an application may be reviewed, will preclude NIFA from making an award.

B. Cost Sharing or Matching

NIFA does not require matching support for this program and matching resources will not be factored into the review process as evaluation criteria.

PART IV—APPLICATION AND SUBMISSION INFORMATION

A. Electronic Application Package

The Project Narrative shall not exceed 18 pages with 12 point font and line spacing not exceeding 6 lines per vertical inch including all figures and tables. We have established this maximum (18 pages) to ensure fair and equitable competition. Proposals exceeding 18 pages in length will not be considered for awards and may not be resubmitted once the deadline has passed for the RFA.

The Project Narrative must include all of the following:

1. Summary of previous potato research: Provide a brief report giving evidence of previous outputs, outcomes, and impacts. For example:
 - Unique segregating populations;
 - Unique clones selected for advanced testing;
 - New genes accessed;
 - New varieties released, and year;
 - Adoption of new and previous varieties from this program;
 - Income added (or protected) for farmers growing these varieties;
 - New markets accessed;
 - Environmental benefits;
 - Other evidence of outputs, outcomes, and impact;
 - Jobs created; and/or
 - Contributions to rural prosperity

2. Introduction: **BRIEFLY** describe the regional and national importance of potatoes. A clear statement of the long-term goals and supporting objectives of the proposed activities should be included. Summarize the body of knowledge or other past activities that substantiate the need for the proposed project. Describe ongoing or recently completed

activities related to the proposed project including the work of key project personnel. Preliminary data/information pertinent to the proposed project should be included.

In addition, this section should include in-depth information on the following, when applicable:

- a. Specific current issues, challenges and opportunities and their importance. Addressing the following (if applicable) –
 - Estimates of the magnitude of the issues.
 - Their relevance to stakeholders, including growers, processors, buyers, and consumers.
 - Their relevance to ongoing state-federal food and agricultural research.
 - Impact of the proposed research on producers and other stakeholders.
 - Proposals should focus on a few major problems, or **CLEARLY** describe and justify the need to spread effort over multiple traits and issues.
 - When describing potato quality traits, state and describe:
 - What an ideal variety would be for this quality trait;
 - What is involved in breeding to improve the trait;
 - Progress toward the desired trait made to date; and
 - Why continued work is necessary.
- b. Reasons for having the work performed at the proposing institution.

3. **Objectives:** Clear, concise, complete, and logically arranged statements of specific aims of the proposed effort must be included in all applications.

4. **Methods:** The procedures or methodology to be applied to the proposed effort should be explicitly stated. This section should include but not necessarily be limited to:
- a. A description of stakeholder involvement in problem identification, planning, implementation and evaluation, including documentation of participation, or reference to documentation, where appropriate;
 - b. A description of the proposed project activities in the sequence in which they will be carried out;
 - c. Techniques to be employed, including their feasibility and the rationale for their use in this project;
 - d. Kinds of results (outputs, outcomes, and impacts) expected;
 - e. Means by which data will be analyzed or interpreted;
 - f. Pitfalls that might be encountered;
 - g. Limitations to proposed procedures; and

- h. Plans to commercialize the results, if within this project, or anticipated steps and outlook for commercialization, if beyond the scope of this project.

If your proposal involves intellectual property not in the public domain, your organizations must indicate whether there is freedom to operate (FtO) and/or any obstacles that might be encountered. Indicate whether cooperators have discussed the benefit of sharing expected products of the research.

5. Cooperation and Institutional Units Involved: Cooperative, multi-institutional and multidisciplinary applications are encouraged.

- a. Identify each institutional unit contributing to the project and designate the lead institution or institutional unit.
- b. When appropriate, the project should be coordinated with the efforts of other state and/or national programs.
- c. Clearly define the roles and responsibilities of each institutional partner on the project team. Include a realistic project management plan and timeline that will ensure efficient functioning of the multi-state, multi-institutional team.
- d. Briefly describe:
 - How the project will be governed;
 - How decisions will be made;
 - Expectations for each project member;
 - Short-, medium- and long-term metrics to be evaluated;
 - A mechanism whereby progress can be evaluated for accountability for federal funds; and
 - How the project will complement and/or link to existing programs or projects.
- e. Project Timetable: The application should outline all important phases of the project as a function of time, including periods beyond the grant funding period.

c. Field 10. Facilities & Other Resources. All facilities that are available for use or assignment to the project during the requested period of support should be reported and described briefly.

d. Field 11. Equipment. All items of major equipment or instrumentation available for use or assignment to the proposed project should be itemized. In addition, items of nonexpendable equipment needed to conduct and bring the project to a successful conclusion should be listed, including dollar amounts and, if funds are requested for their acquisition, justified.

e. Field 12. Other Attachments.

- (1) Appendices to Project Narrative. Appendices to the Project Narrative are allowed if they are directly germane to the proposed project. The addition of appendices should not be used to circumvent the text and/or figures and tables page limitations.
- (2) Collaborative Arrangements. If it will be necessary to enter into formal consulting or collaborative arrangements with others, such arrangements should be fully explained and

justified. If the consultants or collaborators are known at the time of application, a vitae or resume should be provided. In addition, evidence (e.g., signed letter of support) should be provided that the collaborators involved have agreed to render these services. Letters of collaboration must be signed by the respective ARs for both the applicant and the collaborator. The applicant also will be required to provide additional information on consultants and collaborators in the budget portion of the application, such as rate of pay.

- (3) Scientific Peer Review Certification Documentation. Notice that the scientific peer review has been completed should be included in the application (see Part II, D. item 2.)

4. R&R Senior/Key Person Profile (Expanded)

D. Funding Restrictions

Pursuant to Section 1473 of the National Agriculture Research, Extension, and Teaching Policy Act of 1977, as amended, 7 USC 3319, indirect costs or tuition remission are not allowable costs under section 2(c)(1)(B) projects, and no funds will be approved for this purpose. Further, costs that are a part of an institution's indirect cost pool (e.g., administrative or clerical salaries) may not be reclassified as direct costs for the purpose of making them allowable.

NIFA has determined that grant funds awarded under this authority may not be used for the renovation or refurbishment of research, education, or extension space; the purchase or installation of fixed equipment in such space; or the planning, repair, rehabilitation, acquisition, or construction of buildings or facilities.

The statutory time limitation for awards issued under this authority is three years. No award may exceed this statutory time limitation. Any costs being charged to this award must be incurred within the project period.

If a project is selected for funding, additional information may be requested from the applicant.

PART V—APPLICATION REVIEW REQUIREMENTS

A. General

We evaluate each application in a 2-part process. First, NIFA Potato Breeding Research programmatic affiliated staff will screen each application to ensure that it meets the administrative requirements as set forth in this RFA. Second, a technical review panel will evaluate applications that meet administrative requirements.

We select reviewers based upon their training and experience in relevant scientific, extension, or education fields, taking into account the following factors: (a) The level of relevant formal scientific, technical education, or extension experience of the individual, as well as the extent to which an individual is engaged in relevant research, education, or extension activities; (b) the need to include as reviewers experts from various areas of specialization within relevant scientific, education, or extension fields; (c) the need to include as reviewers other experts (e.g., producers, range or forest managers/operators, and consumers) who can assess relevance of the applications to targeted audiences and to program needs; (d) the need to include as reviewers experts from a variety of organizational types (e.g., colleges, universities, industry, state and federal agencies, and private profit and non-profit organizations) and geographic locations; (e) the need to maintain a balanced composition of reviewers with regard to minority and female representation and an equitable age distribution; and (f) the need to include reviewers who can judge the effective usefulness to producers and the general public of each application.

B. Evaluation Criteria

We will use the evaluation criteria below to review applications submitted in response to this RFA:

Relevance (20 points)

1. Relevance and importance of proposed research to specific problems or opportunities regarding the purpose of the grant program as described in Part I, A. and B. (10 points)
2. Value of expected results for the potato industry in states beyond the states represented by the submitting institution and collaborating institutions. (10 points)

Quality (20 points)

1. Overall scientific and technical quality of the application. (10 points)
2. The specific approach proposed. (5 points)
3. Clarity of the proposal. (5 points)

Feasibility (40 points)

1. Performance record of the applicant with reference to the purpose of the grant program as described in Part I, A. and B. (14 points)

2. Feasibility of attaining objectives. (12 points)
3. Adequacy of training, experience, disciplinary expertise, plant materials/genetic resources for breeding, facilities, and equipment. (14 points)

Participation (20 points)

1. More than one state listed as recipient of funds. (5 points)
2. Evidence of cooperation or involvement of multiple institutions. (5 points)
3. Evidence of stakeholder participation, including growers, in developing project objectives. (5 points)
4. Plans to involve stakeholders in project implementation or monitoring. (5 points)

C. Conflicts of Interest and Confidentiality

During the peer evaluation process, we take extreme care to prevent any actual or perceived conflicts of interest that may impact review or evaluation. Names of submitting institutions and individuals, as well as application content and peer evaluations, are kept confidential, except to those involved in the review process, to the extent permitted by law. In addition, the identities of peer reviewers will remain confidential throughout the entire review process, to the extent permitted by law; therefore, the names of the reviewers will not be released to applicants.

D. Organizational Management Information

Specific management information relating to an applicant shall be submitted on a one-time basis, with updates on an as needed basis. This requirement is part of the responsibility determination prior to the award of a grant identified under this RFA, if such information has not been provided previously under this or another NIFA program. PART VI—AWARD ADMINISTRATION

A. General

D. Expected Program Outputs and Reporting Requirements

It is expected that program outputs will conform to the purpose of the Potato Breeding Research grants program. The principal outputs will consist of varietal development and testing using classical methods, or, when appropriate, combinations of new and classical methods; and the development of new potato varieties.

When appropriate to the problems addressed, ancillary or supplemental outputs may include, but are not limited to, improved classical methods, or integrated classical and molecular/biotechnology, for the component steps in variety development and testing; or, improvements in aspects of efficient provision of desired new varieties to growers.

A. Access to Review Information

B. Use of Funds; Changes

1. Delegation of Fiscal Responsibility

Unless the terms and conditions of the award state otherwise, awardees may not in whole or in part delegate or transfer to another person, institution, or organization the responsibility for use or expenditure of award funds.

2. Changes in Project Plans

a. The permissible changes by the awardee, PD(s), or other key project personnel in the approved project shall be limited to changes in methodology, techniques, or other similar aspects of the project to expedite achievement of the project's approved goals. If the awardee or the PD(s) is uncertain as to whether a change complies with this provision, the question must be referred to the Authorized Departmental Officer (ADO) for a final determination.
