EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: NIFA requests applications for the Renewable Resource Extension Act – National Focus Fund Projects (RREA-NFF) for fiscal year (FY) 2015 to provide for expanded and comprehensive extension programs for forest and rangeland renewable resources at a national, regional, or multi-institutional level. The amount available for support of this program in FY 2015 is approximately \$300,000.

This notice identifies the objectives for RREA-NFF projects, the eligibility criteria for projects and applicants, and the application forms and associated instructions needed to apply for an RREA-NFF grant.

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PART I—FUNDING OPPORTUNITY DESCRIPTION

A. Legislative Authority and Background

The Renewable Resources Extension Act of 1978 (P.L. 95-306, 92 Stat. 349, 16 U.S.C. 1671 et seq.) provides for an expanded and comprehensive extension program for forest and rangeland renewable resources. The majority of the appropriated funds (over 92% of the Payments to States Amount) are distributed to eligible institutions based on a formula that considers the geographic extent, ecosystem productivity, economic contribution, and population for each state.

Since FY 2002, a small amount (about 7.7% of the Payments to States amount) of Renewable Resources Extension (RREA) Act (P.L. 95-306 (92 Stat. 349, 16 U.S. C. 1671 et seq.)) Program funds appropriated has been used to fund National Focus Fund Projects (RREA-NFF). For Fiscal Year 2015, the appropriation for RREA is \$4,060,000. From this appropriation, \$162,400 is for Federal Administration. The amount available for RREA-NFF projects is \$300,000. RREA-NFF has expanded comprehensive extension programs for forest and rangeland renewable resources on a national, regional, or multi-institutional scale through better program coordination, innovative technologies, and extension models that can be easily duplicated.

B. Purpose and Priorities

The purpose of the grant program for FY 2015 is to provide funds for projects that:

- (1) Address emerging forest and rangeland resource issues, have national or regional relevancy, or develop new and innovative projects that can be replicated at other institutions; and
- (2) Plan and conduct national forum(s)/symposium(s) to address the current and future needs and issues of existing and yet-to-be-identified clientele and how extension forestry and rangeland resources programs can adapt to increasing demands and forces for change to more effectively plan, deliver, and evaluate the impacts on people and natural resources.

The goal of the RREA-NFF program is to enhance the sustainability of the nation's forest and rangeland resources and to enable landowners and managers to achieve their desired goals and objectives. These projects must provide opportunities for the Cooperative Extension System to maximize its impact and demonstrate capacity and relevance by directly working across state boundaries to bring expertise to bear on common problems. NFF priorities include those that have been described in the FY 2012-2016 RREA Strategic Plan

These focus areas, identified through a strategic planning process with the state and federal partners, represent critical issues and/or areas of emphasis that have broad applicability and relevance across the national at scales ranging from national to single states.

The NFF program is intended to foster innovative program delivery approaches and to economize on RREA resources for issues that are not bound by state boundaries. The FY 2015 NFF program will fund projects that address the two priorities described below.

NIFA is soliciting applications for the RREA-NFF under the following priorities:

- (1) Regional Initiatives to Address Critical Issues Faced by Forest and Rangeland Owners;
- (2) National Forums/Symposia on what the Second Century of Extension Forest and Rangeland Programs must look like to meet the Needs of Our Clientele to effectively address the resource issues and opportunities faced by forest and rangeland owners.

The Renewable Resources Extension Act – National Focus Funds Program is aligned with the USDA Research, Education, and Economics Action Plan (http://www.ree.usda.gov/ree/news/USDA_2014_REE_Action_Plan_08-2014_Final.pdf), and specifically addresses Goal 3 – Sustainable Use of Natural Resources, by providing funding to the Cooperative Extension System to conduct educational programs for private forestland owners that contribute to well-managed forests and the nation’s and world’s fiber supply in support of rural economic systems. RREA is aligned with the NIFA Strategic Plan (http://nifa.usda.gov/about/pdfs/strat_plan_2014.pdf), and specifically addresses Strategic Goal 1 (Science), to optimize the production of goods and services from working lands while protecting the Nation’s natural resource base and environment (Subgoal 1.3)

C. Program Area Description

The NFF projects to be funded in FY 2015 will provide opportunities for the Cooperative Extension System to maximize its impact and demonstrate capacity and relevance by directly working across state boundaries to bring expertise to bear on issues that are regional or landscape in scale. In FY 2015 applications are requested for the following program priorities:

- (1) Regional Initiatives to Address Critical Issues Faced by Forest and Rangeland Owners: Maximum award: \$60,000; Maximum project period: 24 months.

Forest and rangeland issues are rarely and unique to a single state. The main purpose of this priority is to foster collaborative efforts among Extension educators to address issues that are regional in scale by sharing unique areas of knowledge and expertise. Applications for regional initiatives are requested. They must be: 1) Regional in nature, 2) Directly supportive of forest and rangeland owner issues and needs; 3) Either new and unproven, but theoretically sound, or represent a significant change to an existing national or regional project, and 4) Address one or more of the strategic issues in the current RREA Strategic Plan, FY 2012-2016

- (2) National Forums/Symposia: The Second Century of Extension Forest and Rangeland Programs That Meet the Needs of Our Clientele. Maximum award: \$90,000; Maximum project period: 24 months.

The Cooperative Extension System has started its second century of service to the Nation's forest and rangeland owners. In a mere 100 years, Extension programs have evolved from the prominence of face-to-face, in-the-field delivery of programs to a delivery system that is highly reliant on new and emerging electronic technologies that are complemented by face-to-face program delivery. In the past few decades, state and federal agencies and non-governmental organizations greatly expanded their capacities to conduct research and transfer it to end users. How will Extension Forest and Rangeland Resources Programs most effectively and efficiently deliver research-based information and education to clientele when and how they want it, and in an environment where a wide range of program providers offer numerous and similar programs? The answers to these questions require a reexamination of how the Cooperative Extension System will serve forest and rangeland owners going forward into the next 20 years.

PART II—AWARD INFORMATION

A. Available Funding

The amount available for NIFA support of this program in FY 2015 is approximately \$300,000. The funds will be awarded through grants for Priority (1) and grants or cooperative agreements for Priority (2). In the case of cooperative agreement(s), the agency will be substantially involved in the planning of the symposium/forum. There is no commitment by USDA to fund any particular application or to make a specific number of awards.

Awards issued as a result of this RFA will have designated the Automated Standard Applications for Payment System (ASAP), operated by the Department of Treasury's Bureau of the Fiscal Service, as the payment system for funds. For more information see <http://fms.treas.gov/index1.html>.

B. Types of Applications

In FY 2015, you may only submit a new application to the RREA-NFF Program:

New application. This is a project application that has not been previously submitted to the RREA-NFF Program. We will review all new applications competitively using the selection process and evaluation criteria described in Part V—Application Review Requirements.

D. Responsible and Ethical Conduct of Research

RREA-NFF funding may not be used to conduct research.

PART III—ELIGIBILITY INFORMATION

A. Eligible Applicants

Applications may only be submitted by 1862 and 1890 land-grant institutions. Project Directors must have an extension appointment.

Award recipients may subcontract to organizations not eligible to apply provided such organizations are necessary for the conduct of the project. Failure to meet an eligibility criterion by the time of application deadline may result in the application being excluded from consideration or, even though an application may be reviewed, will preclude NIFA from making an award.

B. Cost Sharing or Matching

NIFA does not require matching support for this program and matching resources will not be factored into the review process as evaluation criteria.

6. **Objectives.** Include clear, concise, complete and logically arranged objective statements.
7. **Approach.** This section must include:
 - Who are the project stakeholders and how they will be involved in the project and its evaluation;
 - An Extension logic model (in the form of a figure) for the proposed project and a narrative description of the inputs, outputs, participants, short- and medium-term outcomes, and projected/estimated impacts (long-term outcomes).
 - A description of the proposed outputs and activities and the sequence in which the activities are to be performed;
 - How, when, and where the activities will be provided;
 - Expected outputs;
 - Expected outcomes;
 - A timeline for the project; and
 - A detailed evaluation plan for the project:
 - For outputs, activities, participants, outputs, and outcomes – what will be measured, how, and when; and
 - How the evaluation results will be reported, where, and to whom.
8. **Project Sustainability and Replication.** Describe plans for assisting other institutions/states/regions in replicating the project. Describe any plans for sustaining the project beyond the project period.
9. **Budget.** The budget must support the outputs and outcomes described in the logical model and in the Approach section. Provide a narrative justification for each of the budget lines. Include travel to the ANREP Biennial Conference and/or other professional meeting where you will present the project and its accomplishments.

Program Area/Priority #2: National Fora/Symposia: The Second Century of Extension Forest and Rangeland Programs that Meet the Needs of Our Clientele.

D. Funding Restrictions

Indirect costs are not allowed. Funds may not be spent on tuition remission, food, or gifts. Equipment costing more than \$2,000 must be fully justified in the Budget Narrative.

PART V—APPLICATION REVIEW REQUIREMENTS

A. General

We evaluate each application in a 2-part process. First, we screen each application to ensure that it meets the administrative requirements as set forth in this RFA. Second, a technical review panel will evaluate applications that meet the administrative requirements.

We select reviewers based upon their training and experience in relevant scientific, extension, or education fields, taking into account the following factors: (a) The level of relevant formal scientific, technical education, or extension experience of the individual, as well as the extent to which an individual is engaged in relevant research, education, or extension activities; (b) the need to include as reviewers experts from various areas of specialization within relevant scientific, education, or extension fields; (c) the need to include as reviewers other experts (e.g., producers, range or forest managers/operators, and consumers) who can assess relevance of the applications to targeted audiences and to program needs; (d) the need to include as reviewers experts from a variety of organizational types (e.g., colleges, universities, industry, state and federal agencies, and private profit and non-profit organizations) and geographic locations; (e) the need to maintain a balanced composition of reviewers with regard to minority and female representation and an equitable age distribution; and (f) the need to include reviewers who can judge the effective usefulness of each application to producers and the general public.

When each peer review panel has completed its deliberations, the responsible program staff of RREA-NFF will recommend that the project: (a) be approved for support from currently available funds or (b) be declined due to insufficient funds or unfavorable review.

RREA-NFF staff reserves the right to negotiate with the PD/PI and/or with the submitting organization or institution regarding project revisions (e.g., reductions in the scope of work, funding level, period, or method of support) prior to recommending any project for funding.

B. Evaluation Criteria

We will use the evaluation criteria below to review applications submitted in response to this RFA:

1. Project Justification
 - The issue that the project will address is well-defined and described.
2. Project Merit
 - The proposed objectives, outputs, outcomes, and impacts are clearly described, adequate, and appropriate;
 - The project utilizes theory-based non-formal adult education principles;
 - The project approaches and procedures are original, clearly described, and feasible;
 - The project is innovative in focus, methodology, program delivery, and products; and

- The project outcomes and projected impacts are clearly stated, measurable, and achievable.
3. Project Relevance
 - Adequacy of proposal in response to items required in the Project Narrative;
 - Evidence that partners and stakeholders play an active role in setting project direction and involved throughout the course of the project;

 - Demonstration of feasibility through preliminary and current relevant data.
 4. Project Personnel, Adequacy of Facilities and Equipment, Project Timeline, and Evaluation Plan.
 - Roles of key personnel are clearly described;
 - Key personnel have exemplary expertise to complete the proposed project;
 - Project personnel have extensive, documented experience in developing, leading, managing and evaluating extension programs;
 - Detailed, logical, and achievable timeline of project activities from project initiation through project completion and submission of final report;
 - Clear evidence of staff and budget resources to plan and conduct the project evaluation; and
 - Evidence of institutional capacity, competence, and experience in the proposed area of work is provided.

C. Conflicts of Interest and Confidentiality

D. Organizational Management Information

B. Use of Funds; Changes

1. Delegation of Fiscal Responsibility
