EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: NIFA requests applications for the Special Research Grants Program, Potato Breeding Research (Potato Breeding Research) for fiscal year (FY) 2016 to facilitate or expand ongoing state-federal food and agricultural research programs.

The amount available for grants in FY 2016 is approximately \$1.85 million.

This notice identifies the objectives for Potato Breeding Research projects, the eligibility criteria for projects and applicants, and the application forms and associated instructions needed to apply for a Potato Breeding Research grant.

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PART I—FUNDING OPPORTUNITY DESCRIPTION

A. Legislative Authority and Background

The authority for this program is contained in subsection (c)(1)(B) of section 2 of the Competitive, Special, and Facilities Research Grant Act, Pub. L. No. 89-106, as amended (7 USC 450i(c)(1)(B)).

In accordance with the statutory authority, grants awarded under this program will be for the purpose of facilitating or expanding ongoing State-Federal food and agricultural research programs that: (i) promote excellence in research on a regional and national level; (ii) promote the development of regional research centers; (iii) promote the research partnership between the Department of Agriculture, colleges and universities, research foundations, and State Agricultural Experiment Stations for regional research efforts; and (iv) facilitate coordination and cooperation of research among States through regional research grants.

B. Purpose and Priorities

This grant program supports potato (*Solanum tuberosum* L.) research that focuses on varietal development and testing using classical breeding and/or biotechnological approaches to improve potato varieties for commercial production. Aspects of evaluation, screening and testing must support variety development.

The Potato Breeding Research program directly aligns with the Research, Education, and Economics Action Plan (http://www.ree.usda.gov/ree/news/USDA_2014_REE_Action_Plan_08-2014_Final.pdf) and specifically addresses the following goals:

- Goal 1 – Sustainable Intensification of Agricultural Production, Subgoals 1A, 1B, and 1C (which focus on Crop Production, Health, Genetics, Genomics, Genetic Resources, and Biotechnology);
- Goal 2 – Responding to Climate and Energy Needs, Subgoal 2A. Responding to Climate Variability; and
- Goal 4 - Nutrition and Childhood Obesity.

The Potato Breeding Research program is aligned with the NIFA Strategic plan (http://nifa.usda.gov/about/pdfs/strat_plan_2014.pdf), and specifically addresses Strategic Goal 1 (Science), by advancing our Nation's ability to achieve global food security and fight hunger (Subgoal 1.1).

The Potato Breeding Research program aligns with the USDA Strategic Plan (<http://www.ocfo.usda.gov/usdasp/sp2014/usda-strategic-plan-fy-2014-2018.pdf>), and specifically addresses; Strategic Goal 3, Help America Promote Agricultural Production and Biotechnology Exports as America Works to Increase Food Security; Objective 3.1, Ensure U.S. Agricultural Resources Contribute to Enhanced Global Security.

C. Program Description

Program Name: Potato Breeding Research

Program Code: AN

The Potato Breeding Research program will fund projects that have a high potential to develop potato varieties with a high value to the potato industry.

Research topics should achieve one or more of the following outcomes:

- Identify and introgress traits for resistance to pests and diseases, such as damaging nematodes, the late blight pathogen, and other issues that limit production and profitability;
- Reduce losses to pests and pathogens while reducing pesticide inputs;
- Develop desirable yield and quality traits for new potato varieties; or
- Develop models or forecasting systems to enhance early detection of disease development or pest emergence, allowing producers to implement management responses that will reduce crop losses in a timely manner.

Priority will be given to proposals demonstrating qualified staff; adequate facilities and equipment; a multi-institutional, multi-state approach that involves potato growers, industry partners and universities; and evidence of stakeholder participation in developing project objectives and plans for implementation.

Applications must provide a description and budgeted plan for the release of research results (e.g., data, germplasm, cultivars, genetic resources) that is compliant with the *Research Terms and Conditions* that govern NIFA-funded projects in the areas of plant breeding, genetics and genomics; the terms and conditions can be found at: <http://nifa.usda.gov/resource/nifa-general-terms-and-conditions-grants-and-cooperative-agreements>. The following sections are particularly relevant: Genetic Resources from Outside of the U.S (page 5); and Patents and Inventions including Plant Variety Protection and Release of Animal or Plant Genome Sequence Data, Distribution of Animal or Plant Genomic Resources, and the Release or Distribution of Plant Germplasm (pages 21-26).

Project Director Meeting: It is the intent of the Potato Breeding Research Program to require successful applicants to attend one project director meeting during the term of the project. This meeting will typically be held with other related plant breeding programs. For the purposes of the budget development, applicants are required to request funds for attendance to such meeting (see Part IV B, 6.)

PART II—AWARD INFORMATION

A. Available Funding

The amount available for grants in FY 2016 is approximately \$1.85 million. The funds will be awarded through a grant. There is no commitment by USDA to fund any particular application or to make a specific number of awards.

Awards issued as a result of this RFA will have designated the Automated Standard Applications for Payment System (ASAP), operated by the Department of Treasury's Bureau of the Fiscal Service, as the payment system for funds. For more information see <http://fms.treas.gov/index1.html>.

B. Types of Applications

In FY 2016, you may only submit an applications to the Potato Breeding Research Program as one of the following two types of requests:

- (1) **New application**. This is a project application that has not been previously submitted to the Potato Breeding Research Program. We will review all new applications competitively using the selection process and evaluation criteria described in Part V—Application Review Requirements.
- (2) **Renewal application**. This is a project application that requests additional funding for a project beyond the period that was approved in an original or amended award. Applications for renewed funding must contain the same information as required for new applications; they also must contain a Progress Report (see Project Narrative, Part IV). Renewal applications must be received by the relevant due dates, will be evaluated in competition with other pending applications in the area to which they are assigned, and will be reviewed according to the same evaluation criteria as new applications.

C. Project Types

Only research projects that address potato breeding to improve potato varieties for commercial production will be considered. Each special research grant proposal submitted in FY 2016 shall request funding for a period not to exceed one year. FY 2016 awardees will need to re-compete by submitting renewal applications for additional funding in the second and third years of the project. Renewals are subject to the availability of funding.

D. Scientific Peer Review

Subsection (c)(5) of the Competitive, Special, and Facilities Research Grant Act, as amended (7 U.S.C. 450i(c)(5)) requires applicants to conduct scientific peer review of their proposed research activities in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Secretary prior to the Secretary

making a grant award under this authority. Regulations implementing this requirement are set forth in 7 CFR Part 3400.20. The regulations impose the following requirements:

1) Scientific peer review: Prior to the award of a standard or continuation grant, any proposed research project shall have undergone a review arranged by the grantee. Such review must be a scientific peer review conducted in accordance with 7 CFR 3400.21. Scientific peer review is an evaluation of a proposed project for technical quality and relevance to regional or national goals performed by experts with the scientific knowledge and technical skills to conduct the proposed research work. It must be credible, independent, and arranged by the grantee. Often this review is conducted by faculty peers. It may include USDA employees, but should not be conducted solely by USDA employees. Although evidence of a scientific peer review is not required until an award is ready to be finalized, peer reviews can improve the quality of a proposal. We thus encourage applicants to have proposals peer reviewed before submission.

(2) Notice of completion and retention of records: A notice of completion of the review shall be conveyed in writing to NIFA as part of the Other Attachments (Field 12. of the R&R Other Project Information Form). The written notice constitutes certification by the applicant that a review in compliance with these regulations has occurred. Applicants are not required to submit results of the review to NIFA; however, proper documentation of the review process and results should be retained by the applicant. The notice should state “In accordance with 7 CFR 3400.21 this memo is to certify that this project [title] has undergone a scientific peer review.” If this notification is included within the application, a signature is not necessary. If, however, it is submitted to NIFA after the application is submitted through Grants.gov, the memo must be on the institution’s letterhead and signed by the Authorized Representative.

PART III—ELIGIBILITY INFORMATION

A. Eligible Applicants

Applications may only be submitted by State agricultural experiment stations, land-grant colleges and universities, research foundations established by land-grant colleges and universities, colleges and universities receiving funds under the Act of October 10, 1962, as amended (16 USC 582a et seq.), and accredited schools or colleges of veterinary medicine. Award recipients may subcontract to organizations not eligible to apply provided such organizations are necessary for the conduct of the project. Failure to meet an eligibility criterion by the time of application deadline may result in the application being excluded from consideration or, even though an application may be reviewed, will preclude NIFA from making an award.

B. Cost Sharing or Matching

In accordance with section 1492 of the National Agricultural Research, Extension, and Teaching Policy Act of 1977 (7 U.S.C. 3371), as added by section 7128 of the Agricultural Act of 2014 (Pub. L. 113-79), for grants awarded after October 1, 2014, the recipient of an award from the Potato Breeding Research program must provide funds, in-kind contributions, or a combination of both, from sources other than funds provided through such grant in an amount that is at least equal to the amount awarded by NIFA. The matching funds requirement does not apply to grants awarded:

1. To a research agency of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA); or
2. To an entity eligible to receive funds under a capacity and infrastructure program (as defined in section 251(f)(1)(C) of the Department of Agriculture Reorganization Act of 1994, 7 U.S.C. 6971(f)(1)(C)), including a partner (see Part VIII, E. Definitions for definition of partnership) of such an entity.

Entities eligible to receive funds under a capacity and infrastructure program and exempt from the matching funds requirement include:

- a) 1862 Land-grant Institutions, including State Agricultural Experiment Stations receiving funding under the Hatch Act of 1887
- b) 1890 Land-grant Institutions
- c) 1994 Land-grant Institutions
- d) Recipients of Continuing Animal Health and Disease, Food Security, and Stewardship Research, Education, and Extension Program Funds — Capacity and Infrastructure Program (CIP)
- e) Hispanic-Serving Agricultural Colleges and Universities (HSACU)
- f) Insular Area Schools Eligible to Receive Funds from the Distance Education/Resident Instruction Grant Programs
- g) Recipients of McIntire-Stennis Cooperative Forestry Program Funds

- h) Non-Land Grant Colleges of Agriculture (NLGCA) - (for exemption from the new matching requirement, these applications must include NLGCA certification, see instructions for requesting certification at <http://www.nifa.usda.gov/form/form.html>, and for attaching the certification in Part IV, C. of this RFA)
- i) Recipients of funds under a program established under section 1417(b) of the National Agricultural Research, Extension, and Teaching Policy Act of 1977 (7 U.S.C. 3152(b)), including: (1) 1890 Institution Teaching, Research, and Extension Capacity Building Grants Program; (2) Higher Education Challenge Grants Program; (3) Higher Education Multicultural Scholars Program; and (4) Food and Agricultural Sciences National Needs Graduate and Postgraduate Fellowship Grants Program
- j) Individual public or private, nonprofit Alaska Native-Serving and Native Hawaiian-Serving Institutions of higher education (see 20 U.S.C. 1059d).

A proposal submitted in response to this RFA may indicate that the work will be completed by multiple entities as a collaborative partnership. All partners must have a substantial involvement in the project throughout the life of the project. If a partnership among multiple entities is proposed, the proposal must clearly identify the following:

- 1) A narrative of each entity's clearly established role in the project;
- 2) How each entity involved as a partner on the project will contribute to the execution of project objectives, determination of experimental design, development of the project work plan and time table, and submission of collaborative, timely reports; and
- 3) A comprehensive project budget that reflects each entity's financial or third party in-kind contribution (see section 2 of 7 CFR 3430 or section 96 of 2 CFR part 200) to the total project budget costs.

If a proposal indicates that the work on the project will be completed by multiple entities as partners, and at least one entity is exempt from the matching requirement under #2 above, the entire project will be exempt from the matching requirement regardless of whether all entities involved are otherwise exempt. Any partner entity can serve as the lead entity on the project. All partners must be significantly involved in the project.

After proposals have been recommended for an award, NIFA will determine if the submitted proposal and proposed division of work reflects substantial involvement of all entities involved. If a proposal is recommended for award to a lead entity not otherwise exempt from the matching requirement and the proposal does not reflect substantial involvement of at least one partner that is exempt under #2 above, then the matching requirement will apply. Exemption from the matching requirement for an entity not otherwise exempt is limited to the project for which it is a partner.

Waiver of Match - NIFA may waive the matching funds requirement for a recipient for one year with respect to a competitive grant that involves research or extension activities that are

consistent with the priorities established by the National Agricultural Research, Education, Extension and Economics Advisory Board for the year involved. PART IV—APPLICATION AND SUBMISSION INFORMATION

NOTE: The Project Narrative shall not exceed 18 pages with 12 point font and line spacing not exceeding 6 lines per vertical inch including all figures and tables. We have established this maximum (18 pages) to ensure fair and equitable competition.

The Project Narrative must include all of the following:

1. Summary of previous potato research: Provide a brief report giving evidence of previous outputs, outcomes, and impacts. For example:
 - Unique segregating populations;
 - Unique clones selected for advanced testing;
 - New genes accessed;
 - New varieties released, and year;
 - Adoption of new and previous varieties from this program;
 - Income added (or protected) for farmers growing these varieties;
 - New markets accessed;
 - Environmental benefits;
 - Other evidence of outputs, outcomes, and impacts;
 - Number of jobs created; and/or
 - Contributions to rural prosperity

2. Introduction: **BRIEFLY** describe the regional and national importance of potatoes. A clear statement of the long-term goals and supporting objectives of the proposed activities should be included. Summarize the body of knowledge or other past activities that substantiate the need for the proposed project. Describe ongoing or recently completed activities related to the proposed project including the work of key

project personnel. Preliminary data/information pertinent to the proposed project should be included.

In addition, this section should include in-depth information on the following, when applicable:

- a.** Specific current issues, challenges and opportunities and their importance. Addressing the following (if applicable) –
 - Estimates of the magnitude of the issues.
 - Their relevance to stakeholders, including growers, processors, buyers, and consumers.
 - Their relevance to ongoing state-federal food and agricultural research.
 - Impact of the proposed research on producers and other stakeholders.
 - Proposals should focus on a few major problems, or **CLEARLY** describe and justify the need to spread effort over multiple traits and issues.
 - When describing potato quality traits, state and describe:
 - What an ideal variety would be for this quality trait;
 - What is involved in breeding to improve the trait;
 - Progress toward the desired trait made to date; and
 - Why continued work is necessary.
 - b.** Reasons for having the work performed at the proposing institution.
3. **Objectives:** Clear, concise, complete, and logically arranged statements of specific aims of the proposed effort must be included in all applications.
4. **Methods:** The procedures or methodology to be applied to the proposed effort should be explicitly stated. This section should include but not necessarily be limited to:
 - a.** A description of stakeholder involvement in problem identification, planning, implementation and evaluation, including documentation of participation, or reference to documentation, where appropriate;
 - b.** A description of the proposed project activities in the sequence in which they will be carried out;
 - c.** Techniques to be employed, including their feasibility and the rationale for their use in this project;
 - d.** Kinds of results (outputs, outcomes, and impacts) expected;
 - e.** Means by which data will be analyzed or interpreted;
 - f.** Pitfalls that might be encountered;
 - g.** Limitations to proposed procedures; and
 - h.** Plans to commercialize the results, if within this project, or anticipated steps and outlook for commercialization, if beyond the scope of this project.

If your proposal involves intellectual property not in the public domain, your organizations must indicate whether there is freedom to operate (FtO) and/or any obstacles that might be encountered. Indicate whether cooperators have discussed the benefit of sharing expected products of the research.

5. **Cooperation and Institutional Units Involved:** Cooperative, multi-institutional and multidisciplinary applications are encouraged.
 - a. Identify each institutional unit contributing to the project and designate the lead institution or institutional unit.
 - b. When appropriate, the project should be coordinated with the efforts of other state and/or national programs.
 - c. Clearly define the roles and responsibilities of each institutional partner on the project team. Include a realistic project management plan and timeline that will ensure efficient functioning of the multi-state, multi-institutional team.
 - d. Briefly describe:
 - How the project will be governed;
 - How decisions will be made;
 - Expectations for each project member;
 - Short-, medium- and long-term metrics to be evaluated;
 - A mechanism whereby progress can be evaluated for accountability for federal funds; and
 - How the project will complement and/or link to existing programs or projects.
 - e. Project Timetable: The application should outline all important phases of the project as a function of time, including periods beyond the grant funding period.
- b. **Field 10. Facilities & Other Resources.** All facilities that are available for use or assignment to the project during the requested period of support should be reported and described briefly.
- c. **Field 11. Equipment.** All items of major equipment or instrumentation available for use or assignment to the proposed project should be itemized. In addition, items of nonexpendable equipment needed to conduct and bring the project to a successful conclusion should be listed, including dollar amounts and, if funds are requested for their acquisition, justified.
- d. **Field 12. Other Attachments.**
 1. Appendices to Project Narrative: Appendices to the Project Narrative are allowed if they are directly germane to the proposed project. The addition of appendices should not be used to circumvent the text and/or figures and tables page limitations.
 2. Collaborative Arrangements: If it will be necessary to enter into formal consulting or collaborative arrangements with others, such arrangements should be fully explained and justified. If the consultants or collaborators are known at the time of application, a

vitae or resume should be provided. In addition, evidence (e.g., signed letter of support) should be provided that the collaborators involved have agreed to render these services. Letters of collaboration must be signed by the respective ARs for both the applicant and the collaborator. The applicant also will be required to provide additional information on consultants and collaborators in the budget portion of the application, such as rate of pay.

3. Scientific Peer Review Certification Documentation. Notice that the scientific peer review has been completed should be included in the application (see Part II, D. item 2.).

We evaluate each application in a 2-part process. First, we screen each application to ensure that it meets the administrative requirements as set forth in this RFA. Second, a technical review panel will evaluate applications that meet the administrative requirements.

We select reviewers based upon their training and experience in relevant scientific, extension, or education fields, taking into account the following factors: (a) The level of relevant formal scientific, technical education, or extension experience of the individual, as well as the extent to which an individual is engaged in relevant research, education, or extension activities; (b) the need to include as reviewers experts from various areas of specialization within relevant scientific, education, or extension fields; (c) the need to include as reviewers other experts (e.g., producers, range or forest managers/operators, and consumers) who can assess relevance of the applications to targeted audiences and to program needs; (d) the need to include as reviewers experts from a variety of organizational types (e.g., colleges, universities, industry, state and federal agencies, and private profit and non-profit organizations) and geographic locations; (e) the need to maintain a balanced composition of reviewers with regard to minority and female representation and an equitable age distribution; and (f) the need to include reviewers who can judge the effective usefulness of each application to producers and the general public.

When each peer review panel has completed its deliberations, the responsible program staff of Potato Breeding Research will recommend that the project: (a) be approved for support from currently available funds or (b) be declined due to insufficient funds or unfavorable review.

Potato Breeding Research Program staff reserves the right to negotiate with the PD/PI and/or with the submitting organization or institution regarding project revisions (e.g., reductions in the scope of work, funding level, period, or method of support) prior to recommending any project for funding.

B. Evaluation Criteria

We will use the evaluation criteria below to review applications submitted in response to this RFA:

Relevance (20 points)

1. Relevance and importance of proposed research to specific problems or opportunities regarding the purpose of the grant program as described in Part I, A. and B. (10 points)
2. Value of expected results for the potato industry in states beyond the states represented by the submitting institution and collaborating institutions. (10 points)

Quality (20 points)

1. Overall scientific and technical quality of the application. (10 points)
2. The specific approach proposed. (5 points)
3. Clarity of the proposal. (5 points)

Feasibility (40 points)

1. Performance record of the applicant with reference to the purpose of the grant program as described in Part I, A. and B. (15 points)
2. Feasibility of attaining objectives. (10 points)
3. Adequacy of training, experience, disciplinary expertise, plant materials/genetic resources for breeding, facilities, and equipment. (15 points)

Participation (20 points)

1. More than one state listed as recipient of funds. (5 points)
2. Evidence of cooperation or involvement of multiple institutions. (5 points)
3. Evidence of stakeholder participation, including growers, in developing project objectives. (5 points)
4. Plans to involve stakeholders in project implementation or monitoring. (5 points)

C. Conflicts of Interest and Confidentiality

During the peer evaluation process, we take extreme care to prevent any actual or perceived conflicts of interest that may impact review or evaluation. See http://www.nifa.usda.gov/business/competitive_peer_review.html for further information about conflicts of interest and confidentiality as related to the peer review process.

D. Organizational Management Information

Specific management information relating to an applicant shall be submitted on a one time basis, with updates on an as needed basis. This requirement is part of the responsibility determination prior to the award of a grant identified under this RFA, if such information has not been provided previously under this or another NIFA program. We will provide you copies of forms recommended for use in fulfilling these requirements as part of the preaward process. The date specified by the NIFA awarding official as the effective date of the grant shall be no later than September 30 of the federal fiscal year in which the project is approved for support and funds are appropriated for such purpose, unless otherwise permitted by law. The project need not be initiated on the grant effective date, but as soon thereafter as practical so that project goals may be attained within the funded project period. All funds granted by NIFA under this RFA may be used only for the purpose for which they are granted in accordance with the approved application and budget, regulations, terms and conditions of the award, applicable federal cost principles, USDA assistance regulations, and NIFA General Awards Administration Provisions at 7 CFR part 3430, subparts A through E.

B. Use of Funds; Changes

1. Delegation of Fiscal Responsibility

Unless the terms and conditions of the award state otherwise, awardees may not in whole or in part delegate or transfer to another person, institution, or organization the responsibility for use or expenditure of award funds.

2. Changes in Project Plans

a. The permissible changes by the awardee, PD(s), or other key project personnel in the approved project shall be limited to changes in methodology, techniques, or other similar aspects of the project to expedite achievement of the project's approved goals.
