Please describe the **importance and objectives** of a veterinarian filling this shortage situation as well as being located in the community, area, state/insular area, or position requested above (limit your response to 200 words or less).

**Imperial County occupies 4,175 square miles of the State and it borders on Nevada, Arizona, and the country of Mexico. The county is home to most of California's feed yards (373,866 head in 2009), and in the winter it is a common location for sheep from across the west to be wintered. In 2009, the feeder lamb industry accounted for 140,000 head. In addition, the county also has some dairy goats and range cattle production as well. In total, animal agriculture was a \$343 million business for the county (2009 statistics). The goal is to use the VMLRP program to help attract much needed large animal veterinary services.**

Please describe the **activities** of a veterinarian meeting this shortage situation in the community, area, state/insular area, or position requested above (limit your response to 200 words or less).

**The primary industry a veterinarian would serve is the feedlot industry, which is a great opportunity to practice population medicine as they must be on top of diseases, nutritional deficiencies, and other factors that can contribute to poor weight gains and outright illness. They also can provide services typical to the dairy industry, including pregnancy verification. Because California still requires vaccination for brucellosis, there is a need for an accredited veterinarian to vaccinate local dairy and beef heifers. Given the location of the county and significant degree of animal movements into the area from other states, a veterinarian's skill is needed for disease surveillance.**

Please describe any past efforts to recruit and retain a veterinarian in the shortage situation identified above (limit your response to 100 words or less).

**The large animal practitioner needs continue in the county, yet the number of permanent food animal veterinarians serving the county has gone from 2-3 ten years ago to none now. There is one small animal practitioner that is willing to make some large animals calls, otherwise service comes from a distance, specifically from Arizona. This is a relatively remote area of the State without the large city attractions, and additionally is one of the hottest areas in the nation. However, the livestock industry here provides great opportunities for a practitioner.**

Please describe the risk of this veterinarian position not being secured or retained. Include the risk(s) to the production of a safe and wholesome food supply and to animal, human, and environmental health not only in the community but in the region, state/insular area, nation, and/or international community (limit your response to 250 words or less).

**Maintaining adequate animal health vigilance in this county is extremely important to the entire state. There is a true need for continued veterinary service here because:**

- 1) feeder cattle come in from across the United States and Mexico,**
- 2) sheep from across the western United States may be wintered in this area, and**
- 3) it is located on the border that the flow of wildlife across the border makes for an increased risk for entry and harboring of contagious animal diseases. Without adequate veterinary service in Imperial County, the State of California is at risk.**
